The Kingdom of God Leo Tolstoy

When you think about the author Leo Tolstoy, you probably think of his more famous works such as Anna Karenina and War and Peace. But did you know that Tolstoy also wrote many books about his own faith in Jesus Christ? In 1884 he wrote What I Believe, which was later suppressed by the Russian censorship, and it contained his personal convictions that believers should read and follow the words of Christ and NOT the Church's doctrine, which he calls Christianity. Tolstoy mainly addresses the subject of non-resistance to evil by force, which is to say, that Messiah teaches us to not repay evil for evil, but to turn the other cheek. Tolstoy took this concept of Jesus' teaching to mean that no believer should ever use weapons on another human being, or serve in the military as service to one's country.





As I concluded reading the book, I couldn't help but feel an odd kinship with this brilliant man from Russia who sees both the ridiculousness of mainstream Christianity in his day and the truth of DOING what our Messiah commanded us to do. I think that this bond comes from the knowing that if Leo Tolstoy lived today, he would no doubt be a Th*INK*er! Although I did not get to read this earlier work, I did read Tolstoy's subsequent book, The Kingdom of God is Within You. This particular set of writings expounds upon his belief in nonresistance to evil by force from further research and information he personally received on this matter . Not a quick read but well worth the endeavor, this book will demand all of your attention to ponder the implications of what our Messiah expects of us. In one of my favorite rants, Tolstoy admonishes the priests, soldiers, and workers concerning how the "brethren" of

God should treat one other.

"... We are all brothers, but I take a stipend for preaching a false Christian religion, which I do not myself believe it, and which only serves to hinder men from understanding true Christianity. I take a stipend as a priest or a bishop for deceiving men in the matter of the greatest importance to them. We are all brothers, but I will not give the poor the benefit of my educational, medical, or literary labors except for money. We are all brothers, yet I take a salary for being ready to commit murder, for teaching men to murder, or making firearms, gunpowder, or fortifications. The whole life of the upper classes is a constant inconsistency. The more delicate a man's conscience is, the more painful this contradiction is to him." (pg.70)
